


APRIL ANNIVERSARIES



*Clockwise from top left: 250 years ago in 1771, Richard Trevithick was born in the mining parish of Illogan in Cornwall. 175 years ago in 1846, Great Western became the first locomotive fully built at Swindon works (she ran as a 2-2-2 only for a few months until an axle failure at Shrivenham led to an extra leading axle being added). 150 years ago in 1871, the first section of the Wotton Tramway opened from Quanton Road; actually steam locomotives were not ordered until the end of the year – they had to be lightweight like the survivor pictured since the line was built for horse traction. 125 years ago on Easter Monday 1896 the Snowdon Mountain Railway opened only to close again after a fatal accident in which locomotive L.A.D.A.S. was destroyed, but of course the line has survived with the remaining two locomotives of the original batch, including 3 Wyddfa, illustrated, available for service.*

Just too late to incorporate in the last issue came the sad news that our former member Ken Bampton died on 2 March aged 83 in hospital. Ken was long-time Chairman of the GWS Oxford branch. I understand he began his career as a 'box boy' at Oxford, serving as signalman at Morris Cowley, before working at Nuffield Press and being involved in supply of theatrical lighting. He was a huge supporter of voluntary organisations ranging from the British Legion to Wolvercote Commoners. He had suffered with Alzheimer's disease for the last few years but his physical health deteriorated quite quickly in the last few months. ### RAIL NEWSBRIEFS

Network Rail has allocated £2.2M+ for renewal of 2.5 km of track between Marylebone and Bicester, intended to be completed during lockdown. Over Easter weekend Chiltern Birmingham services were diverted via a reversal at Oxford due to bridge work north of Bicester. \*\* A change in rules permits Great Western to purchase land jointly with other organisations and it has now linked with Moreton-in-Marsh Town Council to acquire a site next to the town's station for a transport hub, initially providing more car and cycle parking spaces. Newbury has also acquired substantial new bicycle storage. \*\* GWR is to restore all-year-round passenger services to Okehampton by the year's end. \*\* East West Rail has launched a consultation on five possible route alignments east of Bedford. \*\* Driving wheel patterns used for 'Saint' *Lady of Legend* have been loaned to the Churchward County Trust to cast the wheelsets for 4-4-0 *County of Montgomery* (the project for which may move to the Gloucestershire Warwickshire Railway). \*\* The *Betton Grange* project (together with unrestored *Cogan Hall*) is also likely to move from the troubled Llangollen Railway, in this case to Tyseley Locomotive Works. \*\* 4920 *Dumbleton Hall* has been sold by the South Devon Railway to help safeguard the line's financial future. 6412 is moving to Chinnor for the season.

### CURIOSITY CORNER...



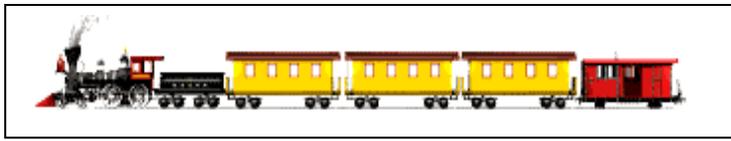
