
Tonight we welcome **Michael Clemens** to present our annual film show.

Extension of through running on the Elizabeth Line has created some previously-unlikely links, such as the combination of Paddington and Clacton on this departure screen at Shenfield station.

The Chancellor's Autumn Statement confirmed that the East West Rail project, as well as HS2, is to

continue, following questions raised during the late political perturbations, so planning for the eastern section will be resumed. AMT Coffee, who operate a number of stalls at stations in the Oxford area, have been bought out of administration by SSP Group, owners of Upper Crust and other brands. The down side buffet at Oxford station has closed, prior to reconstruction of this side of the station.

The Office of Rail and Road have just approved Grand Union Trains' renewed application to run a Paddington–Carmarthen service, intended to use bimodal trains and to be introduced by the end of 2024.

GHOST EXORCISED?

Last Wednesday, Chiltern's once-weekly one-way 11.17 Ealing to West Ruislip "ghost" service ran for what might be the last time. Preparatory work at West Ealing for GWR's trials of a battery train are causing it to be replaced by a similarly once-weekly bus, but it is not certain that the rail passenger service will be reinstated. The service has been timetabled to run empty on other days for maintenance of route knowledge. Start of the battery train trial on the Greenford branch had been suggested as January but seems certain to be affected by Vivarail entering administration from the start of this month, just as London Northwestern has replaced class 230s on the Bedford–Bletchley line by buses.

Incidentally, Drayton Green on the Greenford branch is currently reckoned as London's least-used station. While we're in the area, this month's issue of *Hornby Magazine* includes a description of a most evocative model of Old Oak Common depot in the diesel era; you should be able to read an online version at https://www.keymodelworld.com/article/old-oak-common-western-region-oo-gauge-depot . The real-life site is now obliterated by HS2 works.




