

### FORTY YEARS ON

February will be this newsletter's 40th anniversary – it was first published in 1984. The masthead illustrations were as at present and there were several other mentions of the class 50s – members were advised that the 23.05 Oxford–Paddington stopper was usually double-headed by two members of the class, and there was a forthcoming 50-hauled railtour from Paddington via Oxford to the Settle & Carlisle. The following article reads interestingly in the light of more recent events and is reproduced verbatim:

#### THE BRIDGE BUILDERS.

British Rail are averaging a new bridge a year in this area with three having been rebuilt already. The first was the overbridge at Oxford station, followed by the one over the river Thames near the site of the old Oxford gasworks. Then, in November 1983 the road bridge at Radley was demolished and replaced by a very unattractive pre-cast concrete structure, most of the work being completed in one weekend. This bridge was originally built in the nineteenth century and was the only link between the village and Lower Radley. With vastly increased traffic from Tuckwell's gravel pits over the years it had started to subside and was becoming unsafe.

At present a brand new one (the Fourth Bridge!) is being constructed at Didcot at a cost of over one million pounds over the South Wales main line.

Whilst on the subject of building, B.R. have announced proposals for a new Parkway station south of Hinksey yard. This would of course take a lot of road traffic away from the city centre, being next to the ring road and the park & ride. This site is incidentally where a previous station, "Abingdon Rd. Halt", was situated, but this closed about 60 years ago.
